The Power of

REFLECTIVE QUESTIONS

- How do I use evidence when making moment-to-moment decisions while interacting with children?
- In what ways do I use evidence from assessment to make long-term planning decisions?
- What important pieces of information about children should I collect that are not currently part of my assessment practice?
- How can I strengthen my ability to notice and interpret evidence about children's developmental progress?
- In what ways can I strengthen my capacity to create effective learning experiences based on everyday evidence from children?
- How might I collaborate with colleagues to plan learning experiences based on everyday evidence from our classrooms or child care settings?

TRY IT OUT!

Closely observe an individual child or small group of children in one of the following areas in your early learning setting: dramatic play, block play, water table, reading, small manipulative, art, or sensory.

- What do you notice about children's interests and needs?
- What do you learn about children's developmental progress in any particular developmental domain (literacy, math, social interactions)?

Based on your observations, make a decision about when and how to interact with the child/children you observe.

Record the evidence you observe and use it to make decisions when planning future learning experiences.

How Did It Go?

What did you notice in your observation? Did you discover something new or a different way of "seeing" the child or children? How did you use the evidence when making moment-to-moment decisions or when planning future learning experiences? What might you try next time?

What Next?

Continue to practice using everyday evidence to make decisions. Record your thoughts about the process in a professional journal, and take time to reflect on your practice.
